PARTNERSHIP AT WORK — IN HAITI

Mission Evangelique du Nord d'Haiti (MENH)

A Note from Ebed Paul, President

The MENH Churches —

"The churches remain steadfast and hopeful in the mission the Lord has entrusted to us. Although our churches face significant financial hardships—largely due to the instability of the local governance—our leaders remain committed and resilient. Far from discouragement, they continue with joy and determination to proclaim the gospel and serve their communities."

The churches continue to be engaged in preaching, Bible studies, youth ministries, evangelism, and community service. During July they participated with more than twenty other churches in an annual harvest celebration to extol God's goodness in a service of thanksgiving. People brought their best crops and animals to give to the church. The funds received from the sale of the crops were used to help those in need. Special revival services were held in August during which people responded to the message and committed their lives to Christ.

The MENH School —

The school in Plaine du Nord opened on October 1st to begin the 2025/2026 school year with over 400 students in grades K—12. They were especially thrilled to celebrate the reopening of their preschool program this fall, after nearly a decade of being closed due to lack of funds. In addition to the seventeen preschool children, the school has opened its doors to forty-three refugee children who arrived in Plaine du Nord after fleeing the gang violence in south Haiti.



When the mission can pay school teachers' salaries, the school can admit students who are not able to pay the school fees. However, many of the refugee children are living on the streets with no means of support so additional funds are needed to cover the cost of school uniforms and books in addition to the extra school supplies and training materials required. Currently East West InterKnit is providing most of the funding for teachers' salaries with the financial support of our donors, but we have not been able to keep up. **Please prayerfully consider how you can help.**

The MENH school continues to share the Good News with its students while also achieving high marks for its academics, band, sports teams, and agricultural projects.

PARTNERSHIP AT WORK — IN INDIA

Our partners experience the blessings of God’s guidance, leading and protection; the results are indisputable despite ever increasing challenges

“Your prayer on our behalf means a lot to us.” This is the message we receive consistently from pastors and mission leaders in India as they seek to share the gospel message amid increasing pressure from the government and from hostile groups throughout the country. An increasing number of states have enacted anti-conversion laws. These laws prohibit the use of allurements, force, or fraud to induce conversion. Any Christian humanitarian aid can be considered an allurements; any preaching can be considered use of force; any explanation of the Bible can be considered manipulation. At least one state passed a law allowing for a life sentence on anyone convicted of forced conversion.

Despite these challenges the work in India is producing results. The Bible schools to which we send books continue to send out large numbers of trained pastors, evangelists, and missionaries who are sharing the gospel and seeing many come to Christ. Our mission partners also continue to find ways to communicate the gospel. Just this month one wrote to say that they were able to hold a baptism service for thirty-four new believers. He indicated that this was a real challenge for them due to the “prevailing circumstances” but that they were able to carry it out with “God’s guidance, leading and protection.”

The pastors that we assist regularly send stories of changed lives. We received this in October: Mr. Rao* shared that he came from a tribal group considered among the lowest people on the social scale. He was a self-described drunkard who, he admitted, “behaved badly.” His wife, who was a believer, continuously prayed for him. He committed his life to Christ, was baptized, and was freed from his alcohol addiction. He changed his name to publicly identify as a Christian. He stated that God has done great things for his family since he became a follower of Jesus. The gifts we receive that allow us to assist these pastors are enabling them to purchase Bibles and evangelistic literature and to meet other needs of the ministry as they share the gospel message with hurting people.

Many of the Bible schools and all our mission partners have established children’s homes that care for orphans and children from families unable to care for them. We are told that most of these young people become followers of Jesus, and many go on to serve the Lord in various ministries.

They continue to need our help, but it is becoming more difficult to get funds to our partners in India. Every transaction is scrutinized to determine if it might be used in a way leading to conversions including the conversion of children. As long as it remains possible, we want to be able to continue assisting our partners with the children’s homes, the pastors and the programs serving widows and lepers, as well as other special projects of their ministries. There will be additional expenses in December as they provide clothing for widows, pastors, and the children in their homes in addition to hosting special events as a means of outreach.

Please pray for wisdom as we work through the challenges of encouraging and assisting these partners.

PARTNERSHIP AT WORK — FACILITATING BIBLICAL TRAINING

EWI Library Development Project

We are continuing to process theological books received from our donors for distribution to Bible schools and seminaries in Africa and Asia. During the months of September and October we received approximately 540 donated books and

prepared them for shipping. Our shipping costs during this period amounted to just over \$2,000. We praise God for a shipper who, learning the books were being sent free of charge to Bible schools, chose to reduce our cost by over \$300.

We were also encouraged to receive news of the safe arrival of all book boxes sent. One school leader wrote to say, “The books and material you’ve sent are deeply valued—they’ve made a real difference here. Our students truly treasure them, and our teachers regularly use them in lessons. It’s always a joy to see the excitement on students’ faces when a new box arrives. Seeing how far our students go after leaving our school reminds us of why this work and your support mean so much.”

We have about thirty-five boxes prepared and ready for shipping. We need your help to get them into the hands of eager African and Asian Bible school students.

PARTNERSHIP AT WORK—IN KENYA

Faith and Hope Ministry led by Julian Orimbo, Oduwo

On October 18 Julian wrote to say, “We are so thankful to God as we rejoice with seven teenagers who gave their lives to Christ this afternoon.” All seven are students at Julian’s school and included Villy, the boy who recently lost his father. Julian remarked that “these boys will carry the message of the cross wherever they go” and she asked that we pray for them.

Student exams began on October 27th and continued through November 7th. They had a difficult time getting the exams due to persistent heavy rain. By the 28th the last remaining bridge was underwater. Students who live across the river could not get home so they are staying at the boarding facility where they will need to be fed and cared for. Pray that the rain subsides and the water recedes so they will be able to turn in the completed exams by the deadline.

Julian’s current needs include funding to help cover the costs of caring for the stranded students as well as funding for the semi-annual women’s seminar, the December youth event and seminar, and a December children’s program.

PARTNERSHIP AT WORK — IN ACCRA, GHANA

Good News Theological Seminary (GNTS)

On September 9th twenty-nine students received degrees and certificates in theology at the graduation ceremony on



the campus of Good News Theological Seminary in Oyibi near Accra. In his address, President Oduro highlighted both progress made and ongoing needs of various projects. He also told of the successes of the extra-curricular programs in the Volta, Eastern, and Greater Accra regions of Ghana which provide leadership training and skills development.

The new school year began in early October with differing start days for the B.Th. Class, the Diploma Class and the Certificate Class. **Please pray for the ongoing effort to recruit additional students for the Diploma Class.** East West InterKnit supports their efforts to train students for ministry with a particular emphasis on those who will bring biblical teaching and leadership to African Independent Churches. Our focus is on providing quality resources for their library, supplementing the librarian's salary, providing funds for scholarships, and supporting the publication of books produced by the seminary or its faculty. **Currently additional support for their scholarship fund is needed to make it possible for worthy students to enroll.**
